

Chairperson Wanda Layman on Wednesday, March 21, 2012 at 7:00pm at the Sewickley Township Municipal Building, called the Regular Monthly Meeting of the Sewickley Township Board of Supervisors to order as advertised in The Times-Sun on Thursday, January 12, 2012. Mrs. Layman led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Mrs. Layman swore in Matt Fine as Fire Police.

Report from Road Master, Joe Kerber

We met with the Township Engineer and the Conservation District regarding Volk Road. We need approximately 100 foot of pipe for the job and we are asking Chevron if they would like to work in conjunction with us since they are putting a drive way in for a well. The crew pulled ditches on part of Oggs Lane, Volk Road, and Highberger Road and Shaner Road. Tree brushing has taken place on Taylor, Ted, Lash, Beacon Light, Highberger, and Derr Roads. The grader transmission is now done. We are working on the paver and truck #10.

Roads to be paved with Liquid Fuel money are Firehall Lane and Rillton-Guffey Road. Township money will be used for around the maintenance shed in the back to bring up to DEP specs. Turnback money will be used for Highberger, Beacon Light, Derr, and Apples Mill Roads. Two of the roads may be put on hold if gas wells are going in. With CDBG money, the roads to be paved as long as the money is there is Main Street Alley, Library Alley, Second Street, Sixth Street, Seventh Street, Eighth Street, Highland, Madison, Dexter, and Clopper.

Report from Recreation Director, Janet Schork

We are still waiting for the baseball schedule from Bob Lavella. He will have it to her by April 1st. Once we have it, then we can offer the available time out for renters. We will be starting to work at Crabapple Pool assessing if it will need painted this year among other things. We might be getting a reprieve on the chair lift due to it being a hardship for small communities. We have a dance scheduled at the Recreation Center on March 31st. The last one was a success with over 130 children and made approximately \$500. The public time rules are working and going very well. The Easter Egg Hunt is on Saturday, April 7th at noon. The donations from local businesses for the Egg Hunt are incredible. Lastly, the website is completed.

Report from Ordinance Officer, Dean Zimmerman

Since last month, he has continued to work on various violations in the Herminie, Rillton, and Hutchinson areas as well as spotty violations in other parts of the Township. Some of those have been, and will be, ongoing as he works with the property owners in attempting to bring the properties into compliance. He has begun the junkyard inspections and two (2) have been completed and has three (3) to go.

We recently received some bad news from the Redevelopment Authority of Westmoreland County. Due to a reduction in Federal funding, the Authority has made a policy change that involves matching monies for their demolition program. All properties that we currently have applications on file with the Redevelopment Authority, and all future applicants, will be required to pay \$3,000.00 per demolition in matching monies. Those monies need to be paid by the property owner, the Township, or a combination of both. We are all still working on how the Township will handle this issue.

He now has eight cases in District Court awaiting disposition. Two are scheduled for Summary Trial on Thursday, March 29th. One case still has an active arrest warrant outstanding. The other five are waiting to be scheduled for trials unless those folks plead guilty or do not respond to Judge Christner's summons. If they don't respond to the summons, arrest warrants will be issued for them also.

As the temperatures have begun to rise recently, so have the number of complaints. He reminds everyone that grass and other vegetation is not allowed to be any higher than twelve inches unless you are zoned A-1, Agricultural. Additionally, if you are going to burn your yard waste that has accumulated over the winter or any other legal materials over the course of the summer, please burn on Wednesdays and Saturdays between 6:00am and 6:00pm. If you do that, he won't have to come out and pay you a visit.

Micki Patterson asked if Mr. Zimmerman noticed the property across the street from Crabapple Park. Mr. Zimmerman has sent a letter notifying them of the ordinance violations.

An Executive Session was held tonight at 6:30pm to discuss equipment and personnel issues.

Public Comment

Alan Samulski was called to speak about the Sewage Authority. Mrs. Layman stated first that the MSATS is completely separate from the Supervisors. The only authority the Board of Supervisors have is to appoint the Board. The current MSATS Board has been in place before their time.

Alan Samulski read the following statement:

"You, the elected members of the Sewickley Township Board of Supervisors, were elected in good faith and trust by the voting residents of the Township. You were elected as trustees of the common good and in the best interest of the community at large. With the appointment and subsequent denial of any responsibility for the miscreant actions and operations of the MSATS Board, you have sadly failed miserably in your tasked mission to care for and protect the interests and well-being of the electorate. Our faith and last hope resides in you.

The MSATS Board has not only neglected, but refused, to attend to the real needs and concerns of the "real" people throughout the community. They, themselves, have stated that they answer to no one. You, who are only three, have deigned to appoint a total of nine members to MSATS (the largest sewage board in all the surrounding areas). By far, if three can run the whole Township, why does it take nine to handle the feces? This is clearly top heavy and unwieldy government. Especially when you, yourselves, claim that although you maintain the power and the ability to appoint them, you do not have the power to remove, control them, or their actions singularly or in total. They could not exist nor have been appointed legally under the laws of the Commonwealth of PA and sundry Federal Statutes unless you made and created Township Ordinance in order to do so. We realize that your predecessors bear the brunt of this weight, but it's all you now.

You, the current electees, are obviously failing your bosses, the residents who elected you. And you are claiming there is nothing you can do.

Apparently MSATS now controls you just as you are controlling the citizens by the skillfully manipulated power of fear. And it all comes down to the dollar in the final analysis now doesn't it. The citizens can't appeal to you for redress because you deny any accountability and cry that your hands are tied. Well, the Supervisors handed them the rope or did they tie themselves and each other up?

The residents are afraid of interest on their bills (which are arbitrary and capricious fabrications perpetrated by MSATS to cover their individual and collective butts), to have their water shut off and liens placed on their properties if they don't pay. What kind best interest of the electorate is that?

You are personally subject to the same regulations. They control you because you are afraid that if the Supervisors take control or assume the functions of MSATS, then you, the Township Board, will end up assuming responsibility for their financial fiasco, and in order to cover it, you might as well have to raise taxes (relative or not to the debt in question) and/or not get re-elected. That happened around here before with the school tax debacle. We all, the citizens, do acknowledge, understand, and appreciate that. But if you can establish an Ordinance allowing and permitting you to create MSATS and appoint members to it, then it stands to reason, common sense, and stature-based legality that you can create and establish an Ordinance or Ordinances allowing you to replace members of that board. Stand up. Take the responsibility for the common good of the voting public and just do it.

If you already possess the power, then we urge and implore you to use it. Please indulge me (standing for the people of Sewickley Township and speaking to the common good and welfare of the residents of the community) to put forth these analogies. This is how you are currently being viewed by the community at large... that you are shirking your responsibility and duty to them and side-stepping your tasked mission (by virtue of election) to look out for them. It has been researched and established that as the only responsible elected officials in this district, you can be replaced and voted out of office, mid-term, through legal proceedings. Which many people in the community have suggested and are prepared to do. Some of us don't feel that this would be judicious, but rather you should take immediate steps as a governing body to address and remediate the situation at hand by whatever means available and necessary.

You understandably feel that you are between a rock and a hard place. If you do not already have Ordinances in place to remove members of the MSATS Board, it simply demonstrates a serious short sightedness of you part. We all know how hard taking responsibility for someone else can be, but you were elected to perform the hard tasks as well as the easy ones. Find us some solutions.

The MSATS is your child, or to reference Mary Shelly's "Frankenstein", your monster. Your child, like anyone else's, is currently a juvenile. And you, as parents, are clearly by law, responsible for their actions. It's time for some disciplinary action. If a local juvenile runs amuck in the community robbing, stealing, mugging, and destroying people's property, they and their parents are held accountable and the parents are responsible to stop the child and make restitution or force the child to make restitution. MSATS does not, as they claim, have a 20 million dollar debt. After grants, they have approximately 12 million. It does not have to be paid this week. When questioned on their current, short term financial picture, they evade the question and recite numbers like the total cost of the project.

Let me take the parent/child analogy a step further. We, the electorate, are your creators and parents. You are the parents/creators of MSATS. So, I guess that makes us grandparents. We will not and should not have to raise your children, but we should and will tell you they are out of line and suggest that you take appropriate action to rein them in. So, as your aging, loving parents, we have entrusted you as Power of Attorney and caregivers for our lives and properties. Apparently, you have assigned that task to our grandchild. Well, your child totally neglects and rejects all that we say and do claiming that they have sole power to run their own lives. They are robbing us and seizing our property as well as seriously, negatively in real terms endangering the health and lives of some of us. Would you really let your child (monster) do that to your own real live parents. We certainly hope not.

Our lives and wallets are truly in your hands where we chose to put them and absolutely not in the hands of your brat whom you claim that you can't, or more precisely, won't control.

Mrs. Layman stated that MSATS is over 12 million dollars in debt. If the Township would assume their debt, you, the taxpayers, would assume their debt. We have looked at it at all angles. We are frustrated. We are trying to do what's best for the residents. Is that to takeover the Authority? We are not sure at this point.

Mr. Kerber stated that when one someone is appointed to a Board, the only change of removing them is if they resign or when their term is up. About the finances, if we were to take over MSATS and would have to borrow money, it would go against the Township's borrowing power. If we had a catastrophe, we would be putting ourselves bankrupt.

Mr. Fossi stated that he understands that it has been frustrating for the residents. It has been frustrating for the Supervisors. He was involved with the Sewage Authority for ten years. He was the first Chairman in 1997 when the Township chartered the Board so he has some limited knowledge but things have changed now. Don't think that we have no power or authority to do something. Mr. Kerber is absolutely right in saying that we can not change board members. There is a solution, but we don't want to go there. We could dissolve the Board, but we don't want to go there.

Mrs. Layman wants him to understand that we can not change what has already happened. We can not change the payments. We are not taking this lightly. We have spent a lot of time with this.

Board Comments: Mrs. Layman stated that if a payment is to be made to a bank, it is to be paid directly to the bank. Voting: Mrs. Layman, Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi; yes. Motion carried unanimously.
