

Chairman Alan Fossi on Wednesday, October 21st, at 7:00pm in the Meeting Room of the Municipal Building called the Regular Meeting of the Sewickley Township Board of Supervisors to order as advertised in the Times-Sun on Thursday, January 1, 2015. The members of the Board of Supervisors present were Alan Fossi, Wanda Layman, and Joseph Kerber. Mr. Fossi led those present in the Pledge of Allegiance.

An Executive Session was held on Thursday, October 15, 2015 at 2:00pm, before the budget meeting, to discuss employee wages.

Report from Public Works Director, Mike Volpe

I provided a full copy of my report to the board. The storm sewer project was completed on Wilps Drive. Collapsed pipes were repaired on Wilps Drive and Wineland Drive. Road repairs were done on Sunnyside Drive, Rodebaugh Road, Slaughter Hollow Road and McGrogan Road. In house paving continued on Country Lane and Middlemiss Road. Tresco Paving started the hot mix paving program and Apples Mill Road, Van Kirk Road, Pepermill Circle, Wilson Drive and Firehall Lane were completed. They are now working on Wineland Avenue and waiting for the water company to finish taping in residents to finish Wilps Drive. Mrs. Layman asked if we heard from the water company. Mr. Volpe stated that they are starting to tap in residents. They had to pressure test the lines, chlorinate the lines and wait for test results to come back. They are doing some one calls and by Thursday they will start taping in residents. Mr. Volpe stated that he has been calling them daily. Mr. Kerber stated he did not get a copy of Mr. Volpe's report. Erika Horvat provided one for him at that time.

Report from Ordinance Officer, Mitch Gross

Since our last meeting I have been handling the usual complaints of high grass, junk motor vehicles, and garbage on various properties around the township. We have had some success with having two problem properties in Herminie brought into compliance, one on Highland Ave and another on Madison Ave. I spoke with the Revitalization Coordinator of the RACW but we didn't get much good news. We currently have two properties up for demolition, one on Clay Pike and another on Clopper Street. Unfortunately both properties have gone on hold due to historical compliance issues. I was not given an estimate for a new date for the demolitions. I was told that the former Walker Glass property on Sewickley Avenue has entered for the free and clear sale, but the coordinator says that it may not be for a few years. The former Mikes Bar has been removed from the Judicial Sale since the Mortgage Company has resumed paying the taxes on the property. The one piece of good news we received was that the Ferenz property at the corner of Sewickley Ave. and Pike St. will be purchased through the County Land Bank on December 1st. Hopefully we will start to see some progress with some of the blighted and abandoned properties in the Township.

Report from Recreation Director, Janet Schork

Crabapple Pool:

- Pool final winterizing will be started the week of November 1st once baseball season is over and we can turn off the water for the ball fields, park, and pool.

Recreation Center:

The recreation Center is now open:

- Once again spots are filling quickly.
- All weekday evenings are filled as well as our returning morning senior groups
- We will again partner with Jump Start Sports to offer Fall/Winter Sports Camps/Clinics:
 - Basketball for ages 4-9 on Saturdays, Noon-2pm. From December 5th through January 16th.
 - Soccer starts on January 30th and runs through March 5th on Saturdays Noon-2pm.
- New this year will be the Fit Kids Club. Laura Readal, owner of Comeback Fitness, will be continuing her exercise/nutrition program that was started as part of the Library reading/summer program. Her program will be held on Wednesdays and Saturdays October through December. If the fall session is successful, we will offer it again in January to run until spring.
- I am also working on setting up adult fitness classes for Saturday mornings with Laura. These will include Zumba, yoga, aerobics/weight training. I will have the details at November's meeting.
- I'm happy to report that the 16 bricks purchased from 2010-2012 "Buy-a-brick fundraising program were placed in front of the flag pole by the walkway to the recreation center. Thank you to Alan Fossi for completing this project for us. The area looks beautiful!
- Our new Sewickley Township Recreation Sign was installed in front of the recreation building front door and looking good.

Recreation Board Activities:

- Open Gym/Public Time will start on Wednesday, November 18th. To accommodate our Fit Kids Club, the time will be from 6:30pm-8pm. Once the club concludes, the open gym will start at 6pm on December 30th and continue through March.

Butterfly Garden Crabapple Park:

- The entrance sign will be installed this Saturday, October 24th.
- Benches and picnic table will be placed either this fall or in the spring of 2015.
- I will have before and after pictures at next month's meeting.

Mr Fossi would like to apologize to the people who bought the bricks for the fundraiser. They were bought back in 2009 and never displayed. We were never aware of this. We found these bricks in the Rec Center, found out what they were for and displayed them properly.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to approve the minutes of the Sewickley Township Board of Supervisors Regular Meeting held on August 19, 2015 as reviewed. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Public Comment

Arnold Yanosky lives on the intersection of Tomatko Road and McGrogen Road. There is a catch basin across from his driveway that water is not going into. It all comes down my driveway. My son-in-law has to shovel gravel out of my driveway and I now have a creek that comes through my yard. The ditches coming off of the hill have not been cleaned out and the grass is above the road and the water comes onto the road then onto my driveway. Mr. Volpe stated he has been down there and we will be cleaning the ditches out there and on several other roads.

Dan Augustine has a few questions for the board. He wanted to know if we could get a few firetruck exit signs for when the firetrucks exit onto the road. Mr. Volpe stated that Penn Dot would give us the permission to hang the signs but we would have to purchase them ourselves. Mr. Augustine would also like to know if we could get the flag markers for the fire hydrants so they are easier to find when they get covered with snow. Mr. Fossi asked if we look into the cost, would the fireman be willing to install them. Mr. Augustine said he believes they would. Mrs. Layman stated they would need a total of how many they would need to get a cost. Mr. Volpe stated that he thinks they are about \$50 apiece. Mr. Kerber suggested seeing if we could use a different kind of post or pole.

Mr. Balog lives on General Braddock Road. He again is asking about the curb issue on his street. The contractor has paved over the curb and brought the street at least 7 or 8 inches higher than his driveway. It has caused some water issues. My curb has never been put back to the way it was. It stopped at my neighbors. Mr. Volpe stated that it is on his list to get repaired either the end of this week or next week. Mr. Balog stated he wanted to make sure this was on record and in the minutes. He wants the issue taken care of because it causes a sheet of ice to form in his driveway.

Tom Lord is asking about the honor roll in Cowensburg that was taken down. He thought Jared Filapose had gotten a \$4500 grant around the year 2005, to get it repaired. It has not been replaced yet. Mr. Fossi stated he has no knowledge of this. Mrs. Layman stated we do not have any outstanding state grants. Linda Harvey stated she remembers the issue with the cannon and getting the cannon fixed also. Mr. Kerber remembers the issue with the cannon and trying to get it back from the person who was fixing it. Mr. Lord stated that Jay Prezer has the plack. Mr. Fossi said he would look into it and we will have to do some research.

Angie Johnson lives on Korpar Lane. The road is terrible. She is here to find out if it is a Township Road or not. She has a bill from a broken rim from her car. You can't get up and down the road in the winter. It has not been paved in years. The drains are clogged. Her driveway washes out every time it rains. It needs determined if it is a Township road or not. It is not OK to have to pay for repairs on my car that I have to go to work in because my road is so bad. Mr. Fossi explained he was there on Saturday and that we have determined what part of the road we are responsible for. We found an agreement from 1984. Mr. Fossi stated we are going to have a meeting after wards to discuss this situation. Mr. Volpe stated he was there to patch some potholes.

Bruce Totin lives on the top of Korpar Lane that is not Township property. It is really bad up there and a firetruck could never get up there. Mrs. Layman asked if there is enough room to make a turnaround. Mr. Kerber stated you need a 40 ft. circle. We need to make it Penn Dot standards to get liquid fuels. Mr. Volpe stated one stipulation would be to make a turnaround and residents would have to give up the ground to the Township to do so. Mr. Totin stated the fuel truck will not even come so he could get fuel. Mr. Fossi explained this is a complicated issue. We are governed by Penn Dot and this is Liquid Fuel tax money that comes in. We just can't decide to take over roads if everything is not taken care of in the correct manner. Mrs. Layman stated we need to first get an engineer in to see what we need to do to bring it up to Penn Dot standards. We do not want to bring it up to Township standards because they would be higher. Mr. Totin asked if anything will be done before winter. Mr. Kerber stated no, because it is a private road and that is inappropriate use of taxpayer dollars. Mrs. Layman stated we are saying we

need to look into what it will take to turn the private drive into a Township road. Mr. Kerber stated that it also has to have a 36ft right away.

Bob Weaver lives on Korpar Lane. He went on to explain how bad the road is. He stated that there was one trailer up there that had a private road to one trailer. Now there are 3 or 4 nice homes up there. It is hard to travel that road in the winter. People have gotten stuck and I've had to help several people get unstuck. I'm concerned if an accident would happen, emergency vehicles wouldn't be able to get up there. If we can get the top of the road fixed it will eliminate some of the problems for the people down below.

Pat Kelly also lives on Korpar Lane and wanted to thank Mike for coming up to fix the potholes but it's not going to last. We need a new road with a new drainage system and pipes. I know it will cost allot of money but we all do pay taxes.

Jeff Thoma was questioning the paving on Apples Mill Road. On September 28th it was paved in a downpour and was continued to be paved for an hour and half as I drove by. He was asking why nobody was there. Then October 2nd Firehall Lane was being paved and it was also raining that day. Who's going to pay for this when the roads fail? Mr. Volpe stated he talked to Tresco that morning and they stated they would wait until 9am to take a look at the weather. They then were supposed to scratch Firehall Lane. At 9am I proceeded to go over there but they were already on Apples Mill Road. I grabbed the foreman and told him he wasn't supposed to do anything till after 9 and you were supposed to scratch Firehall Lane. They already had the tact oil down so I told them to sweep the road off. They had a couple loads down and then quit around the bend and waited until the rain stopped. They then went over to Firehall Lane and scratched it. The second day they came out, they used a couple loads to do one side. The next day the last truck got a flat tire by the Dairy Queen. It started to rain so they waited until it quit raining to sweep the road before they put the last load down. Penn Dot has some guidelines when you can pave and can't pave. The contractor has to guarantee the road for two years. Mrs. Layman stated that Penn Dot came out. Mr. Thoma stated that the roads are already coming apart. Mr. Thoma asked why they were never stopped and what was the temperature of the asphalt. Mr. Kerber then asked Mr. Volpe why he doesn't have anybody out there watching these guys and the depth of the material and taking weight slips. Mr. Volpe stated he has all the weight slips and while running our crew I was periodically checking on them for the depth. Mr. Kerber stated he got out there before Mike and they were already done to the valley. Mr. Volpe stated he was there at 7am and they called and said they weren't going to be there until 9:30 so I then went to go and take care of our crew and get stuff moving. When I went back over I grabbed the foreman and told him you have to quit until it stops raining.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to disburse 2014 EMS Tax funds on behalf of Lowber Volunteer Fire Company as follows:

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to approve the Smouse Plan. This plan located off of Bells Mill Road, subdivides Lot 1-A from Lot 1-B becoming a side lot addition to an adjacent property owned by Rex and Darcy Smouse. The right of way to Lot 1-A was extended to access the combined parcel. Lot 1-A has an existing residence with on-lot septic. A non-building waver was provided for the combined lot. The properties are zoned A-1 and have public water available on Bells Mill Road. This plan has been approved by the Planning Commission. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to approve the Mosser Plan. This 49.03 acre parcel is to be sub-divided into Lot 1 containing 29.69 acres located on Apples Mill Road from Lot 2 containing 19.34 acres accessed from Carnegie Road. Lot 2 contains an existing house with on-lot sewage. Lot 1 has an approved septic permit. Electric is the only public utility available. Zoning is A-1. This plan has been approved by the Planning Commission. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to approve the Drop Plan located on Spruce Street, a private right of way located off of Clay Pike in Rillton. The Sub-division separates Lot 1 containing 4.0838 acres from the residual 85.5 acres. The lots are located in an A-1 zoning district. Public water and sewer are both available. The corrected plan shows both the water and sewer right of ways. This plan has been approved by the Planning Commission. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to set the general fee for subdivision applications at \$225.00 effective January 1, 2016. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to revise the approved mineral right lease with Chevron which includes a prohibition against any surface disturbance or pipelines. This was originally approved at the May 20, 2015 meeting. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to ratify the renewal of Township Property, General Liability Insurance, and Workers Compensation Insurance through Rupp-Fiore Insurance Management, Inc. The premium for the Workers Compensation Insurance is \$49,582.00 which is an increase of \$1,055.00 and the premium for General Liability Insurance is \$32,850.00 which is a decrease of \$12,263.00 from last year. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mrs. Layman; yes. Mr. Fossi abstained, Motion carried

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to disregard the 10% deduction from Township employees for their Short-Long Term Disability and Life Insurance coverage. Due to the change to Lincoln National Life Insurance Company, the Township is saving approximately \$850.00 per month. Currently, the employees are paying a total of \$36.66 per month. Mrs. Layman stated to Mr. Kerber that if we have enough people to take this we can drop the payment by \$800. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to adopt Resolution 26-2015 authorizing the destruction of certain records in accordance with the Municipal Records Manual. Mr. Kerber asked how we were destroying the records. Mrs. Layman stated that the Blind Association will take them and shred them. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to adopt Resolution No. 27-2015 establishing the real property tax rate for fiscal year 2016 at 9 mils for general Township purposes and an additional 2 mils to support ambulance, rescue, and other emergency services on each dollar of assessed valuation of property located within the Township of Sewickley. The general purposes assessment represents a decrease of 1 mil from prior years. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to introduce proposed Ordinance 2015-4 establishing the Tentative Budget for 2016 as the Proposed Budget for 2016 with adoption to be considered at the regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors to be held on Wednesday, November 18, 2015 at 7:00pm. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to advertise the availability of the Proposed Budget for 2016 with public inspection being made possible at the Municipal Building between the hours of 8:00am and 3:30pm beginning Wednesday, October 21, 2015. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to introduce proposed Ordinance 2015-5 establishing the assessment for the cost and expense of the maintenance of street lighting in the Herminie, Rillton, Lowber, and Sutersville Light Districts of the Township for fiscal year 2016 at the following rates (this is not an increase from the previous year):

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to approve the use of Act 13 funds for repairs needed on Turner Valley Road and Shaner Road, up to an estimated maximum amount of \$55,000.00. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to ratify an expenditure of Act 13 funds in the amount of \$138,182.84. This was used for repair work on various roads within the Township. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to ratify Erika Horvat to work over her allotted 29 hours by 45 minutes on the payroll date of September 25th and 30 minutes on the payroll date of October 16th. This is due to the budget meetings. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to ratify Mitchell Gross to work over his allotted 25 hours by one hour on the payroll date of September 25, 2015. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to set the Crabapple Pavilion rental rates for 2016. Rates are listed on the last page of this agenda. There is no increase from the previous year. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

Joe Kerber made a motion, seconded by Wanda Layman to approve the planting of a Sweet Gum Tree at Crabapple Park by the Eagle Scouts from Troop 259. This is to honor their scouter leaders' dedication to the troop and the community. Voting: Mr. Kerber, Mr. Fossi, Mrs. Layman; yes. Motion carried unanimously.

3. Defacing and/or removing park property, including trees, shrubs, and flowers is prohibited. Violators will be subject to prosecution.
4. Loss or damage to personal property is not the Parks responsibility. Sewickley Township shall not be held liable for personal injury.
5. Park Hours: 8:00am to 8:00pm. No overnight privileges.
